# From the Rabbi...

May and June are the end of a synagogues yearly financial life. Hebrew school concludes with a party on May 12<sup>th</sup>. Sunday school ends with a family day on May 15<sup>th</sup>. The Haftarah class that I have taught for the entire Jewish year ends for the summer on May 17<sup>th</sup>. We will have our final Bar Mitzvah for Spencer Eccles in June.

Personally, I receive a Doctorate in Divinity on May 5 - acknowledging the 25 years that I have served as a Rabbi. My eldest, Bailey, dances at her senior prom and celebrates with her peers at High School graduation. I named 7 babies - all first children of the couples I have married in the past five years.

Every month is a time for endings and beginnings. Every day brings us endings and beginnings. We can't understand one without the other. We are taught as we study Torah that there is no past and no future, everything occurred at the same time. Does that mean that Moses was born, sent down the river Nile, was adopted by Batya, married, had children, went against his grandfather, Pharoah, became the first prophet of the Jewish people, argued with the Jews repeatedly until God stole his final kiss, taking Moses' breathe. The Torah would argue yes. The goal of Moses' life, if we are to understand it through the eyes of Torah is that Moses would lead the people to the Promised land of Israel. Yet is never happens. Moses dies, his mission is not finished.

This is the essence of every life. We never reach that final goal; we are never meant to. Our purpose is in how we live daily. Pirke Avot, the Ethics of the

# From the Rabbi... (continued)



Rabbis, teaches in the name of Rabbi Tarfon: You are not obliged to complete the work, but neither are you free to desist from it.

This year's Confirmation class has chosen this Rabbinic phrase to describe how they see the world. We cannot even begin to make retribution for 500 years of African, Spanish, and Indigenous people in America, without acknowledgement and working for equality today. We destroyed the earth through climate change - how

do we roll the clock forward and backward at the same time. We all know that social media is a disaster and a massive spreader of misinformation, but how many of you would be willing to give up your phones? And so, we dig deeply into human rights for all people knowing that it has not started with us, nor will it end with us.

Rabbi Jonathan Sacks, may his memory be for blessing, taught, "Consider the structure of biblical narrative. In literature there are many kinds of narratives, but they all have one thing in common, what Frank Kermode called 'the sense of an ending'. They reach closure. Some end with 'they all lived happily ever after'. We call these fairy tales. Others end in death and defeat. We call them tragedies. There are other types, but they all have a beginning and an end. That's what makes them stories.

Now consider Genesis. The Jewish story begins with God's call to Abraham to leave his land, his birthplace and his father's house to travel 'to the land that I will show you.' Seven times God promises Abraham the land, yet he has to haggle with the Hittites to buy one small plot in which to bury Sarah. Jacob and his family are forced into exile in Egypt. Genesis ends with the promise unfulfilled.

Then Exodus begins. God calls Moses to lead the Israelites back to freedom and the promised land. Now, we feel, the story is about to reach closure. But it doesn't come. Instead, a journey that should have taken days lasts forty years. In the final scene of Deuteronomy, we see Moses, still on the far side of the Jordan, granted only a distant vision of the land. Again, the natural ending is deferred.

Tanach as a whole ends, in <u>II Chronicles 36</u>, with the Israelites in exile again, this time in Babylonia, and Cyrus giving them permission to return. We are almost back where we began, in the same region from which Abraham and his family first set out.

I know of no other stories that have the same form, namely a beginning but no end. We would not think of them as stories at all, were it not that we know the ending. It has been there since the beginning: God's three promises to Abraham, of children, a land, and an influence on humanity such that 'through you all the families of the earth will be blessed'. So, there is an ending, but it is always beyond the visible horizon. The Jewish story ends, as Moses' life ended, with a glimpse of the land not yet reached, a

future not yet realized.

Although our personal calendars close for this time of year, so that some of us can take a Sabbatical, our Jewish calendar never closes or begins. On June 4<sup>th</sup>, 4 Tammuz, 5782, we stand on Sinai with Moses again to receive the commandments. We can see this as a moment of beginning and it is one of the Jewish New Year's but looking at the context of Torah, it is just something that happened in the middle. I wish you more middles. May we learn to live every day as if it's a first and a last, understanding that holiness happens during the inbetweens.

# Notes from the Cantor

A while back, I wrote about American Jazz legend Dave Brubeck, as an example of a Gentile who wrote Jewish music. Dave Brubeck had written a major oratorio highlighting some of the shared struggles

of the Jewish and African American communities. Dave Brubeck also named his first born son Darius after his esteemed Jewish mentor in Jazz Music Composition. That person was Darius Milhaud (pronounced me-YO). Before he became Dave Brubeck's teacher, mentor, and inspiration, before he wrote such renowned works as Scaramouche (the name of a roguish clown character in Italian comedy) and La Creation Du Monde, and a host of Jewish works in Europe and in the United States, and before he became one of a prominent group of composers known as Les Six, Darius Milhaud's life story began in Aix -En-Provence, France. He was actually born in Marseilles in 1892, but spent his childhood in Aix-En-Provence and came from a prominent lineage among Provencal Jewry. Apparently, Darius Milhaud's great grandfather was one of the founding members of the synagogue at Aix.

Milhaud started out as a violinist but later turned to composition. From 1917-1919, he served as secretary to Paul Claudel, the French ambassador to Brazil who was also a poet and dramatist, and he set many of Claudel's texts to music. He also took a big interest in Brazilian folk music. However, it was a trip to the US in 1922, which propelled Milhaud's interest in Jazz which became reflected in a 20 minute work called La Creation Du Monde ("The Creation of the World") in six movements: 1) Overture, 2) The chaos before creation, 3) The slowly lifting darkness and the creation of trees, plants, insects, birds, and beasts, 4) Man and woman created, 5) The desire of man and woman, and 6) Man and woman kiss.

He married his wife, Madeleine in 1925 and she bore him a son, Daniel, in 1930, who would grow up to be a painter and sculptor. In 1940, the Milhauds fled from the rise of Nazism and the Vichy government, to Oakland, California, where he secured a teaching post at Mills College.

Neil Levin, the Director of Milken Archve, points out that it was after his experience as a Jewish refugee fleeing to America, and also learning of the murder of many of his relatives, that Darius Milhaud's Jewish works became more frequent. While still in Pre-war Europe, he composed a cycle called Poemes Juifs (1916) and several other Jewish works. It was after fleeing to America that Milhaud composed Cain and Abel, for narrator, organ, and orchestra; Candélabre à sept branches; David, an opera written for the Israel Festival; Saul (incidental music); Trois psaumes de David; Cantate de Job; Cantate de psaumes, and Service Sacre, a full length Shabbat morning service in an oratorio setting; and Ani maamin: un chant perdu et retrouvé ("I Believe: A Lost and Recovered Song").

Scaramouche, La Creaton Du Monde, the very inspirational Service Sacre, and many of Milhaud's other works can be found on the internet. I especially recommend Service Sacre. The works of Darius Milhaud are important jewels in our vast treasure trove of Jewish music.

- We negotiated contracts with our clergy and office staff for 2022-2023 fiscal year.
- The Board has approved the slate for 2022-2023 which includes several new trustees.
- -We will be doing religious school for our students only.
- We have received approval to rent from the Parish House but all the details need to be

worked out and some office construction will be necessary.

- The membership committee needs people excited about our future and willing to work on ways to increase our membership.
- We have received a donation of handbags (12 plastic bins worth) and need ideas on ways to monetize them.
- RAC (Religious Action Committee) has a NJ office. During this very political time in our country, perhaps you would like to be our liaison.

# Religious School...

I cannot believe that this is the last Religious School article for the year. Our Hebrew program on Thursday afternoons was outstanding. I would like to thank the teachers for stepping up and committing to teach and tutor our children to the point that the older children are certainly ready to lead services from the Bimah and our younger students who entered school not knowing a Hebrew letter, can now read full lines.

At our monthly Tefillah services, both the Cantor and I could see that your children could chant the prayers and sing songs and prayers, with much Ruach and joy.

I would officially like to thank the Cantor for leading Tefillah and our beloved teachers for their love and dedication to our Hebrew School program: Morah Bain (7<sup>th</sup> grade), Roger Held, Betsy Best, Sara Schwartz (6<sup>th</sup> grade), Amy Rosenman, Sara Schwartz (3 and 5<sup>th</sup> grades). Sara Schwartz also created Google classroom documents where each student could sign in to work on their prayers and how they were chanted. Students could find activities for reading Hebrew, learning the letters, understanding the meaning of the prayer and why it is where it is in the prayer book. Sara made sure to include videos, both serious and funny and information about every holiday. We are hoping to use this tool for the entire congregation beginning in August.

We tried to keep our outstanding programing in place. The 6<sup>th</sup> graders made Yads from which to read the Torah, as they become B'nai Mitzvah. The fifth graders created wimples, which will be wrapped around the Torah, as they become B'nai Mitzvah. During both the Thursday sessions and the Sunday sessions, we had programming for each and every holiday with stations for learning, singing and creating ritual objects.

Sunday school was held with the students of Congregation B'nai Israel. What seemed great in theory, did not work out so well in practice. CBI had a large number of students all from Millburn, who had, for the most part, been in preschool together. We had few kids from Springfield. Rabbi Julie and I made the mistake of thinking that the kids would try to get to know each other and mesh. Sadly, that did not happen and in fact, our students were turned off and decided that it was not worth coming. I apologize for the pain that it caused to some of our students. It was part of our contract in renting at Congregation B'nai Israel that we would join them for the Sunday program. I am promising that Temple Sha'arey Shalom will create our own student learning opportunities for the future. I want to thank Cantor and Amy Rosenman and Morah Best for teaching in the Sunday program.


Keshet, our high school program was small but mighty. The three students, Morah Bain and I have studied together for the past year and it has been an honor to learn from and study with our Keshet students.
