From the Rabbi...

One of our students in religious school asked what I did one Tuesday. I went on to share my schedule with him: gym from 7-8:30 am, take a class from 8:45-9:45 am, teach a class from 10-11 am, ran to do a Catholic funeral (more later), back to the Temple from 2-8 pm. It was a wonderful day, filled with so many meaningful activities for me. He asked that since I was a doctor, why did I have to take more classes? Then he stated, "I hate school, and you choose it."

I love to learn. When I was going through rabbinic school, one of my professors shared that as part of his congregational life, he never taught the same class twice so that he could learn and teach at the same time. I love this idea. I still take classes in Talmud, zoom into a Hebrew speakers room once a week and am studying the Koran with an Imam and other clergy of all different religions.

Staples, with its clean new notebooks and flowing pens calls to me often. I am not one who takes notes on my computer and puts them in files, I probably should. Instead, I hand write notes, and put them into hard binders which line my bookcases.

Judaism is replete with quotes about study: "Where there is no knowledge there can be no insight, and where there is not insight, there can be no knowledge" from Pirke Avot, a part of the Talmud. "Knowledge is as good as currency", Reuven Alcalay (author of the Concordance).

Did you know that there is a Biblical dictionary? The words are only in Hebrew and tell you the other

places that they appear in Torah. If you are researching the word, you can only determine it in context and by its root. Therefore, the words Morah/ Moreh (teacher), Horim (parents), Torah all have to do with learning.

As Jews, we are taught to always learn and always teach.

We have many adult ed opportunities this year:

Haftarah and Prophets: 10 -11:15 am every Tuesday morning on Zoom: The HafTarah is a selection that is related to the weekly Torah portion weekly but is taken from the Books of the Prophets, Judges or Kings. During several times in Jewish history, we were not allowed to study Torah for fear of being put to death. The Rabbis collected sections of the Prophets and Writings that were connected to the Torah portion to study. Now we read Torah and HafTarah together. We learn about the prophets, their messages and the time of Jewish history in which they lived, while also studying the section from the Women's HafTarah Commentary. You need no former learning to come and study.

Study Minyan: Every Shabbat morning from 11 am - 12 noon on Zoom. Join in this yearly Torah study. In the past, they have studied Torah, Jewish History, the Prophets, Views of God. This class is unique and a great way to learn about everything Jewish.

Coming up this year:

- A four part session taught by Rabbi Joshua Goldstein, our Rabbi Emeritus on a variety of interesting Jewish topics, beginning Monday, November 14 at noon, at our new home.
- Lectures by John Kendrick (our musical maven)
- Zoom with the Nobel Peace Prize winner: Ales Bialitatski, the Ukrainian and Russian leader of the human rights organization Center for Human and Civil Liberties
- Shabbatot with musicians Steve Dropkin and Barry Merer, master guitarists and song writers for the Reform movement.
- More musical experiences
- The Israeli Short Story Club with Rabbi Edelman
- Cantor's two classes and more

& Notes From The Cantor &

Now ... Jenny Diver ... ho, ho ... yeah ... Sukey Tawdry

Ooh ... Miss Lotte Lenya.... and old Lucy Brown Oh, the line forms on the right, babe Now that Macky's back in town.

-----Bobby Darin from "Mack the Knife."

"So tell me, Cantor. Where are you from originally?"

"I grew up in Haverstraw, NY."

"Where is that near?"

"If you exit the Big Apple via the Tappan Zee Bridge, you end up on the NYS Thruway North. Exit 12 is Nyack....."

"Oh! We've heard of Nyack!

".....and Exit 13 is Haverstraw."

This is usually how the conversation goes when I describe the geography of my youth. One very long, direct route that connects Haverstraw and Nyack is called 9W. I grew up along a small suburban road called Hillside Ave which runs parallel to Route 9W until it arcs to intersect with it less than half a block from our old house. Where Hillside Ave and 9W intersect in Haverstraw, NY is the start of a cemetery with many different sections. In my twenties, I learned of a most unusual piece of Jewish Geography. Less than a mile from the house in which I grew up, is the final resting place of a very lovely famous composer/entertainer couple. Their names were **Kurt Weill** and **Lotte Lenya.**

The most popularly well known work of Kurt Weill is probably his 1928 Die Dreigroschenoper, called in English, The Threepenny Opera, one of many works on which he collaborated with Marxist librettist Bertholt Brecht. In the synopsis, a shady, infamous outlaw named Macheath, runs off with a London beggar's daughter, and, through a web of jealousy and intrigue, is nearly executed for his crimes. The anti-heroic protagonist is introduced by the opening song, "The Ballad of Mac the Knife," which was later popularized in 1958 by Bobby Darin, whose lyrics are a departure from the original German libretto. In Brecht's original libretto, one of Macheath's alleged murder victims is "Schmul Meier bleibt verschwunden und so mancher reicher Mann/ Shmuel Meyer, reported missing like so many wealthy men." The Bobby Darin version instead mentions Sukey Tawdry, Jenny Diver, Miss Lotte Lenya, and old Lucy Brown. These names are

comprised of three fictitious characters from the synopsis and one real person, Weill's lovely wife, Lotte Lenya, who starred in most of his works and who sang the very first staged performance of the song.

Kurt Weill was born the son of a Cantor in Dessau Germany on March 2nd of the year 1900. Early in his life, he supported himself by directing synagogue choirs. Sources indicate that it was Weill's collaborations with Brecht which propelled him to fame and became associated with the politics and cultural innovations of Weimar, Germany. With the left wing political leanings of their operatic works, Kurt Weill the Jew and Bertholt Brecht the Marxist became early targets of Nazi riots and demonstrations, particularly during productions of an opera called Mahogany as well as Threepenny Opera. In 1933 Weill and Lenya, discovering that they were soon to be arrested, fled Germany to Paris. There they got divorced. However, a few short years later, they were reunited in the United States.

The one liturgical work for Synagogue written by Weill was his magnificent setting of the Sabbath Kiddush, commissioned in 1946 for a project at the Park Avenue Synagogue in New York. I had the opportunity to perform this work when K was in Akron, Ohio. In this setting, the words of the Kiddush are interwoven with a reverent, bluesy, triplet-adorned motif which repeats throughout the piece in both the melodic line and the accompaniment. Although this was his one and only synagogue work, Weill also wrote Jewish pageants, one of which was called The Eternal Road.

Once, while teaching an Adult Ed class on Jewish Composers of the 20th Century, I had presented samplings of Jewish Composers which included Bernstein's angry Kaddish Symphony, the song, "It Ain't Necessarily So," from Gershwin's Porgy and Bess, and Kurt Weill's Kiddush. The interesting thing about "It Ain't Necessarily So" is that musical scholars debate whether George Gershwin had derived his chromatic melody from a familiar, strictly pentatonic synagogue motif associated with the Blessings of the Torah which every synagogue assigns as an honor when the Torah is read. Ironically, this comparison pairs diametrically opposite sentiments which seem to make its case even more compelling. In the Gershwin song, a drug dealer named Sportin Life is regaling the good people of Catfish Row with a mocking

challenge to Biblical narratives. The music is compared to the chanting of "Blessed is the Eternal who has given us a Torah of Truth, and who has implanted Eternal Life within us."

Why do I bring up a Gershwin song in an article about Kurt Weill? It turns out that Kurt Weill knew the Gershwin brothers and had attended one of the dress rehearsals for the original production of Porgy and Bess. When I had played a sampling of Weill's Kiddush for

an Adult Ed class, some of the attendees drew an interesting connection between the middle of Weill's Kiddush and the Gershwin song in question. Where the text of the Kiddush declares, "b'ahava uv'ratzon hin(h)ilanu, zikaron l'ma'aseh v'resheet."/"In love and favor, You made the holy Shabbat our heritage as a reminder of the work of Creation," Weill's melodic line takes on a chromatic flavor. While I was whistling just that one part, it was pointed out to me that I was also whistling, "It Ain't Necessarily So." Whether he did so wittingly, coincidentally, or subconsciously, Weill took Gershwin's motif from the irreverent speech of Sportin Life and religiously re-sanctified it.

Religious School Happenings

Thanks to the master teaching of Pam Bain, religious school is going very well. Morah Bain teaches two seventh graders, Tuesdays and Thursdays from 3-4:30 pm. The prayers coming from her classroom are pure joy. We have five students becoming B'Nei Mitzvah this year: Kyle Sargis, Jack Kessler, Sammie Rosenman, and Ava and Parker Bronson, who are working with Morah Bain. The sisters are both on the autism scale and wanted to become B'not Mitzvah more than anything. They are filled with joy with the experience of meeting and learning with Morah Bain. We are very excited, as a community to welcome them to the Bimah, and help them achieve their dreams before family and friends.

David Bronson, their father reached out to us last year. He was having trouble with finding a synagogue that would work with them. They live in Caldwell and he made many calls and was met with rule after rule. When he finally called Morah Bain, and then myself they were met with open arms. Whatever was possible for these beautiful, determined young women to achieve their goal of becoming B'not Mitzvah, we would make possible.

I am so proud to teach the three passionate, social justice minded, connected to Judaism in our High School program. Although we have one student in Keshet (our Hebrew High School program) and two students in Be You (our program for the 11th and 12th grade), we have powerful discussions. Be You is open to any 11th and 12th grader who does not belong to another Temple and wishes to learn more about Judaism while discussing what happens on college campuses and how to be confident in yourself during the process of deciding what to do after High School. There is a special fee of \$150 per year for students who want to be in this program without their families having to be members of Temple Sha'arey Shalom.

During my years as a Rabbi and Educator, I have met many different adults. There are those who want to learn more about Judaism from an adult level because they hated religious school and do not want to pass the attitude that Judaism is important to other family members. There are those adults who became B'nai Mitzvah and were done with Hebrew school and never came back because it was not a priority and have made the same decision for their kids, and there are those adults who continue to study because religious life does not stop at 13. Imagine that you went to regular school through the age of 13 and then decided not to remain in school. Most parents and students think that this would be ridiculous. What would you learn about life, how to behave, what you would know about math, or science, modern events, or how to write? We treasure education in the secular world, perhaps because we assume that the more

learning you have, the more comfortable you will be in the physical world of financial success.

Our students who stop learning about Judaism in the 7th grade, will not have pride in their sense of Judaism, will not learn about our values, will never know how to confront those who throw anti-Semitic tropes in their faces. It is not too late to have your child return to become a Confirmand in 10th grade or come once a month to learn more about Judaism as teens. It is never to late to expose your kids and grandchildren to a community of their peers. We begin religious school in first grade. If you wish to learn more, please do not hesitate to reach out to me.


