From the Rabbi...

Simchat Torah is one of my favorite Holydays because it is filled with absolute joy. Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur are about life and death and how we prepare for both. On Sukkot, we notice just how fragile our existence is; then right after the end of Sukkot, we dance with our Torot.

After fragility and death, we dance. The night before my first stroke, I felt off. I knew that something physically was going to happen to me. So I took precautions. I made sure that I had a babysitter at the house all day. I called the school and told the secretary that I would be taking the kids out of school early. As well, I put Shane on high alert. That night at about 6 pm when it started getting dark, it began to rain heavily. It was not so cold so I took the kids out in the front yard and danced. I raised each one above my head as if we were in a ballet. We made our own music. It was a moment to savor. I was conscious of making a powerful memory for my kids. And it did. We came inside, dried off and they excitedly told Shane, when he came home, about our adventure. Sadly, the next day at 11am, I realized that my gait was different. I picked

the kids up from school and dropped them with the sitter. Speeding above the limit, I arrived at St. Barnabas' emergency room and then I collapsed. It was not as dramatic as it seems. I lost time. I lost memory. I had to relearn speech. They say that when the body experiences trauma, the brain shuts the memory away. I still do

not know how long I stayed in the hospital. I know that I did not need physical rehab but I did go to speech therapy for a year. After fragility, we dance. I danced a lot that year. I could think and type and move my body so we had dance parties every night.

Like death, we finish the reading of the last Parashah of the Torah and then with one breathe we run from the end to chant the beginning. With one breath we end and are reborn and begin to dance with the Torah Scrolls. We pass the scrolls from person to person, and watch the swirling colors, and bend and bow to the music. One continuous Jewish moment of history, created each year again and again. I get caught up in the memory of it all, how it feels to hold the Torah tightly like a baby, rocking her in my arms and then handing her to another in the community. We dance because we have survived another year. We dance because we are a free people. We dance with Miriam and the women. We dance with the men of Fiddler on the Roof. We dance because we can, even if we have disabilities or challenges. Come dance with me at our Simchat Torah Service.






Dear Friends,

Cantor's Corner...



💰 Notes From The Cantor 🐇

We've all heard of the famous beautiful setting to Kol Nidrei by composer Max Bruch set for solo cello and orchestra. Many of us have also

heard that he wasn't even remotely Jewish despite the fact that all of his music would be banned by the Nazis over assumptions surrounding the abovementioned work. Although "bruch" means "blessed" in Hebrew, in German it means "breakage" or "fracture." Recently, I read several articles online debating whether or not this Nineteenth Century composer was even fond of the Jewish people at all. Though some sources state that he was friends with many Jewish composers, other sources are pointing out that Max Bruch was eager to establish that he was not Jewish and that he did not share Johannes Brahms' affinity for the Jews. So what, then, would inspire someone to arrange and orchestrate the preexisting Jewish motifs of one of our holiest prayers in a highly acclaimed work of classical music as well as to write an oratorio about the life of Moses?

Max Christian Friedrich Bruch also known as Max Karl August Bruch lived from 1838-1920. He had a long distinguished career as a teacher, composer, and conductor moving among many different musical posts in Germany and also England. From a musical compositional standpoint, he was more of a proponent of the style exemplified by Brahms and he opposed the style exemplified by Richard Wagner. The incontrovertible scoop on Wagner seems to be that he intensely disliked the Jewish people. An article from the Forward, written by Leon Botstein about six years ago suggested that it was this stylistic opposition to Wagner which led Bruch to take a politically more tolerant and cosmopolitan attitude which would distance himself further from the other

composer.

Bruch had apparently learned the Kol Nidrei melody from Cantor Abraham Jacob Lichtenstein who was chief Cantor of Berlin and to whom Bruch had been introduced through Ferdinand Hiller, his mentor. (An interesting side note is that Cantor Lichtenstein's choir director was none other than Louis Lewandowski whom Reform Jews consider to be the most famous Jewish Composer of the Nineteenth Century.) In a letter to musicologist Edouard Birnbaum, Bruch stated that he was fascinated with "folksongs of all nations," a category in which he considered Kol Nidrei to belong, as opposed to a sacred liturgy of the ages.

An excellent point was made in the above-mentioned Forward article. Regardless of how the composer personally felt about the Jewish people or even his attitude towards the subject matter, Max Bruch's Kol Nidrei is no less of a musical treasure than Gershwin's Porgy and Bess and Copland's Appalachian Spring, two works by Jews which have virtually nothing whatsoever to do with Jewish Music. Is Bruch's Kol Nidrei Jewish music? The debate goes on.





Religious School Happenings

Dear Friends.

Jewish learning for our youth and teens is upon us and I am so excited for our new offerings. Our program now begins at 1st grade and continues through High School graduation. Jewish education should be a part of everyone's lives. If we end in 7th grade, we have the Jewish knowledge of a twelve year old. Would we want the same for our kid's secular learning?

Our program this year is robust and exciting. We have classes on Tuesdays and Thursdays from 4-6 pm at St. James' Educational building, right across from our old Temple Building.

We begin with grades 1 and 2 coming on Tuesdays from 4-5 pm to give them a taste of things to come. 3 rd grade - 5th grade will come to religious school weekly to learn of our history, our values and to begin B'nei Mitzvah preparations. Those in grades 6th and 7th will be solely focused on Bar or Bat Mitzvah training.

Students will receive their Torah portions in 6th grade and begin to read them for meaning in English and to chant them in Hebrew. They will also receive their HafTarah portion as soon as they work on the Hebrew. Our goal is to have each and every student prepared and excited about becoming a B'nei Mitzvah at Temple Sha'arey Shalom.

As usual, your students will be working with Morah Bain on their prayers and individually with in house TSS tutors. They will be on the Bimah at Hatcher Hall well before they become a Bar or a Bat Mitzvah.

For 7th grade after they become Bar/Bat Mitzvah through 10th grade, students are recommended to continue their religious school education with Keshet, our Hebrew High School, taught by Betsy Best and myself, or to join Makom (the place) the Hebrew High School of Union County, usually held at Temple Emanuel-El of Westfield where students will be able to learn interesting topics taught by the Reform and Conservative Rabbis of Union County. This exciting program was introduced last year to high acclaim. If you

are a high school Junior or a Senior, you have the opportunity to discuss what happens on college campuses, from the BDS (anti-Israeli movement) to how to discuss anti-Semitism on campus to being without your families for the first time of your life.

In the Keshet and Be You program, we will be serving pizza, if we have enough students. Please come and join us. We are so very excited to see you and to learn from you!!!!






